The Text

(1) A girl of 14 has won her three-year struggle to be allowed to wear trousers to school. This decision may lead to other schools across Britain changing their uniform rules, ending centuries of tradition.

(2) Jo began her fight after feeling cold in lessons during her first year at Whickham Comprehensive School in Gateshead, then discovering that women teachers could wear what they wanted. Her mother, Professor Claire Hale, took her side and launched a claim for discrimination, despite widespread support from other parents for the old rule. Jo's mother claimed that her daughter was disadvantaged by wearing a skirt because of its cost and lack of freedom of movement - and that she believed wearing trousers could offer protection against an assault.

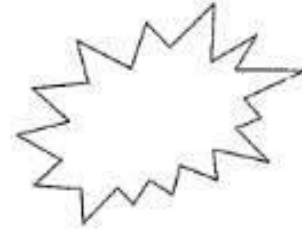
(3) The Equal Opportunities Commission took up the case. Schoolgirls will have a choice between skirts and trousers from September. The school was unhappy to be forced to change the old rules. "I am delighted that my friends and myself can now wear trousers", said Jo yesterday. "Now I will be glad to put all this behind me and get on with my school work. After all, if you're in class and doing your work, what does it matter if you're wearing trousers? I hope that schools will realise that this is the way of the future."

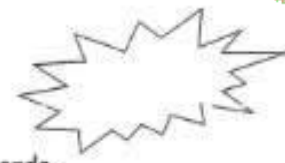
